AHMED'S STORY



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Ahmed is a 40-year-old builder/decorator, who lives in Cyprus with his wife and two young daughters.

Ahmed's elderly parents, his brother, his sister-in-law and his four nieces and nephews had to flee their homes in Syria because of the Syrian war.

Ahmed left his home in Cyprus and went to help them as they travelled from Syria to Europe to find a safe country to live in.

People seeking safety in a different country to their own are called refugees. On 16 September 2015 Ahmed and his family arrived at a border between two European countries, Serbia and Hungary. They found that the Hungarian government had built a fence to stop refugees entering Hungary.

Many refugees were at the border. Some attempted to get through the fence. Hungary's police responded with tear gas and water cannon, injuring dozens. Some people threw stones, including Ahmed. News footage also shows Ahmed using a megaphone to call on both sides to remain calm.

Ahmed was arrested by Hungarian police and was sentenced to 10 years in prison on a number of charges, including "an act of terror" for using the megaphone and for throwing stones.

Ahmed's wife and daughters still live in Cyprus, where Ahmed wishes to return.

Ahmed has asked for an appeal which means that a court looks at his case again. The first court hearing for Ahmed's appeal is on 15 June 2017.

We are sending your messages of solidarity to the prison where Ahmed is being held. We hope that this will give him some warmth and strength, and we also want to show the prison officers that we care about him.






Take appeal action
