Campaigning

United Arab Emirates

June 28th marks 100 days since prominent Emirati human rights defender and blogger Ahmed Mansoor was detained in the UAE.

Ahmed Mansoor was arrested at his home in the United Arab Emirates (UAE) on 20 March this year. Security officials entered his home and searched it. They confiscated his phones and other electronic devices, and after three hours of searching the property, they took Ahmed away. On 3 April, he was taken, with his hands and feet shackled and head shaved, to a prosecutor's office for one short supervised family visit. Since then, he has not been allowed calls with his family. He is currently being held in solitary confinement without access to a lawyer.



To mark the 100 days , we will hold a short vigil in Albert Square, in front of Manchester Town Hall, with candles and posters. This will take place immediately before our regular group meeting on June 26^{th} .

Please gather at 6.30pm in Albert Square. Following the short vigil, we will walk all together to our scheduled group meeting.

Please can as many people as possible attend! Please wear an Amnesty T-shirt if possible

If you haven't signed the online petition on behalf of Ahmed Mansoor, do it now. There are plans to close it soon and deliver it to the authorities.

East Asia (inc Burma)

Amnesty has issued a new 51-page report 'All the Civilians Suffer: Conflict, Displacement and Abuse in Northern Myanmar' which details how soldiers from the Tatmadaw, as Burma's armed forces are known, mete out torture and extrajudicial executions, shell civilian villages indiscriminately and place punitive restrictions on movement and humanitarian access.

Meanwhile, some ethnic armed groups have been known to abduct civilians seen to support an opposing party, forcibly recruit men, women and children into their fighting forces, and impose "taxes" on impoverished villagers trapped in the conflict.

Amnesty this year conducted more than 140 interviews between March and May, following renewed fighting since August in Kachin and northern Shan states, which border China. Amnesty visited towns and villages in areas affected by fighting as well as 10 camps for internally displaced persons, and spoke to civilian victims and eyewitnesses, community leaders and humanitarian officials.

Following the election, we sent out the following Press Release:

'AMNESTY MANCHESTER SAYS NEW GOVERNMENT MUST KEEP HUMAN RIGHTS TOP OF THE AGENDA

As a Conservative / DUP alliance looks more and more likely, the members of the Manchester group of Amnesty International are

urging the newly formed government to ensure human rights are protected.

Kate Allen, Director of Amnesty International United Kingdom, said: "The misguided threats to tamper with our human rights in the name of security just days before the election clearly did not resonate with the public.

"Human rights are a vital cornerstone of our society, and must be protected and promoted both at home and abroad by the next government. As the new government is being formed, human rights must remain top of their agenda, and they must carefully protect our values and our freedoms."

Anne Walker, Group Secretary of the Manchester group of Amnesty International, said: "Theresa May's previous comments about ripping up human rights laws are reckless and misinformed. Human rights are there to protect all in society that is just pure common sense. As a group actively campaigning to keep human rights at the top of the agenda, we urge anyone in Manchester to continue to put pressure on their local candidates to ensure this is the case.'


