Round up of October group news



October Group meeting: our main item was a training session, led by Susan, on the new global campaign - I Welcome refugees. This will last two years, taking us up to the end of 2018. The overall campaign goal is 'Refugees are protected and enjoy their human rights through strengthened global responsibility-sharing and international co-operation. AIUK has identified

four long term outcomes, with each having a strand of work contributing to them: communities, movement building, political change and responding to global events. As part of the movement building we will be endeavouring to make contact and work with other local groups and organisations who are sympathetic to our aims. And we will be using every opportunity we have to

raise the issues in our forthcoming events. In the meantime, here are some facts to think about:

- By the end of 2015, there were 65.3 million forcibly displaced people in the world.
- The top five source countries for refugees (UNHCR statistics) are: Syria, Afghanistan, Somalia, South Sudan, and Sudan.
- The top five host countries for refugees are: Turkey, Pakistan, Lebanon, Iran, and Ethiopia (UNHCR statistics).
- Palestinian refugees, of whom there are 5.2 million worldwide, are counted separately. Syria hosts the most Palestinian refugees.
- In 2003, 70% of refugees were hosted by developing countries. In 2015, that percentage had increased to 89%. So rich countries, such as the UK, are doing even less to help with the crisis.
- The fastest growing refugee crisis is in South Sudan.

Holocaust Memorial Day (HMD) will be marked in Minehead on Friday 27 January 2017. The planning group has been busy developing their ideas for this day. *Chris Lawson reports*: Plans are developing for



recognizing this day in Minehead. Revd Simon Robinson and some AIM members have met as a planning group and are now making contacts with a range of people with a view to their involvement. Central features will be a vigil in Wellington Square and events in St Andrew's Church throughout the day. These will include visual and other materials for reflection in the church, with short presentations in words or music at regular intervals. Revd Donald Reeves, a former Rector of St James Piccadilly and Director of Soul of Europe, which seeks to support those in post-conflict situations, will give a talk in the

evening, based on his experiences of reconciliation work in the Balkans. Space for an exhibition at the library has been readily agreed and booked. Campaign News

Write for Rights: this annual campaign runs from 1 November to the end of December. It features a number of prisoners of conscience from around the world and we are invited to send greetings cards or write letters on their behalf. See the diary dates column for details of our campaigning events on 9 November and 9 December. Information will also be displayed beside our Christmas Tree at the festival. And Susan Mew will be reporting back at our next meeting on the AIUK launch of the 2016 campaign.

Ethiopia: *Cherry Bird writes:* Reports of escalating problems in the **Oromia region** have recently made world news. The BBC reported (3 October) on an incident at a religious festival when police attacked peaceful protestors with rubber bullets and tear gas, causing a stampede into nearby ravines. At least 52 people were killed, possibly many more. This is the latest in a series of violent clashes in Oromia and Amhara, homelands of the country's two biggest ethnic groups. In both cases unrest was triggered by land issues and exacerbated by the fact that while Oromo and Amhara people form 34% and 27% of the population respectively, they feel marginalised by a government that is dominated by people from the Tigray region, who form only 6% of the total population. Prime Minister Hailemariam Desalegn denies accusations of unwarranted use of violence and says rioters caused pre-planned mayhem that caused people to fall to their deaths. He praised troops for their actions.

On 15 Nov at a **public event** in Westminster, London, a Swedish journalist will describe his experiences of being imprisoned in Kaliti (the prison where Eskinder Nega is being held). He was detained there for 14 months for investigating abuses related to the oil industry.

Foreign secretary Boris Johnson continues to refuse to ask the Ethiopian government to release British citizen **Andy Tsege**. Afghanistan: the international community and the Afghan government are failing to address the problems of internally displaced people and to recognise that the threat from the Taliban has not gone away. The EU notes that the Taliban now controls more territory than ever before, with 'record numbers of attacks on civilians' and children the fastest growing group of victims. The recent decision of the Pakistan government to send back 3 million Afghan refugees will make matters even worse. Government corruption is a major problem. Those of us who wrote to MEP Clare Moody received a helpful reply mentioning anti-corruption measures agreed on and highlighting the special needs of women and children and ethnic minorities such as the Hazara people.
