Many report being beaten, verbally abused and subjected to forced medical examinations while in custody. Ask the President to release them immediately. ## Campaign News

**I Welcome Refugees** *Jill reports:* the speaker at our very well attended September group meeting was County Cllr Frances Nicholson, who as Cabinet Member for Children and Families, has the Vulnerable Syrian Persons Resettlement Scheme in her portfolio. Cllr Christine Lawrence accompanied her. Cllr Nicholson outlined the County Council's response to the UK Government's pledge to re-settle 20,000 Syrian refugees by 2020. Somerset would take up to 50 families and 17 had already been housed in Taunton, Bridgwater and Frome. Cllr Nicholson described the issues that have to be considered before placing a family: suitable housing (private rented), school places, religious and language needs, access to public transport, hospitals etc. Minehead had been ruled out as not being an area where those needs could be met. Families had sometimes chosen to move away, or accept different housing, but on the whole re-settlement had been a success, and volunteers' help had been invaluable. Cllr Nicholson learnt about the Minehead and District Refugee Support group, formed this year, and the fact that Dr Orla Dunn, Public Health consultant to the Council Scheme is said to be 'looking at Minehead again', and considering the Skills Bank of the group. AIUK has asked groups to focus this autumn on fundraising for the I Welcome campaign (including for Rohingya refugees in Myanmar). Our group has agreed to send £700. Online petitions can still be accessed at [www.amnesty.org.uk](http://www.amnesty.org.uk) asking European leaders that safe channels for refugees and migrants are expanded, Mediterranean rescues stepped up, and an end to refugees being returned to persecution in Libya.

**Anti-Death Penalty project:** AIUK is launching this new project on 10 October, International Day Against the Death Penalty. Events are planned in London and Sheffield on that day. Campaigning against the death penalty is a core part of what Amnesty does, and the new working group will be looking at how to increase the impact of this work. **Ethiopia** *Cherry reports:* Good news is that the state of emergency imposed a year ago, which gave extra powers to the military, has now been lifted. This means constitutional rule of law will return. Good news also that an Ethiopian journalist (**Elias Gebru**), who was detained for months without charge, has been released on bail. Sadly, there is no news about **Eskinder Nega**, who remains in prison, serving an 18-year sentence. Meanwhile British citizen **Andy Tsege** also remains in prison under a death sentence, with no sign of his release and no chance of appeal. However, we are told that, as a result of increasing pressure from the UK government, he now has regular, private consular access and contact with his family. According to an open letter from Foreign Secretary Boris Johnson, "Britain does not interfere in the legal systems of other countries by challenging convictions .... (but) .. we do lobby strongly and consistently against application of the death penalty."

**Women's Action Network (WAN)** *Cherry reports:* Following the relaunch of the WAN this year, the team is busy developing ideas that will have a positive impact on women's human rights. Amnesty hosted the Festival of Choice on 16 September with speakers from International Planned Parenthood Federation, London-Irish Abortion Rights Campaign and Hollaback (an organisation working to end public harassment of women). Looking ahead, from 25 November to 10 December there will be 16 days of activism against gender based violence. Ideas for this are currently being discussed.

**Other events:** Several of us went to see **The Landings**, a complex production performed in fields, on tracks and along the beach between Blue Anchor and Dunster. It involved lots of walking and various routes, with the audience following different groups of players. It was a thought-provoking and moving portrayal of refugees and their dangerous, and often tragic, journeys.



Susan went to the Budleigh Salterton Literary Festival to hear **Dr Shirin Ebadi**, the Iranian lawyer, human rights activist and recipient of the Nobel Peace Prize. Susan met several other AI members there, including Sue Hazelwood who used to be in our group, and she bought a copy of Shirin Ebadi's book 'Until we are Free'.
