

# **Background Situation update - November**

#### U.N. condemns arrests of Congo opposition members

On 22 October, police broke up a meeting by the Union for Democracy and Social Progress (UDPS) party on the eve of a return to the city of opposition leader Felix Tshisekedi in the southeastern city of Lubumbashi. Officers arrested about 30 opposition members. The U.N. peacekeeping mission in Congo condemned the arrest of the opposition members.

Congo's government has banned opposition demonstrations since last year.

#### **Delayed elections**

Earlier this month, the national electoral commission (CENI) announced that the election to replace Kabila can't take place until April 2019. Subsequently, activist groups in Goma had called for a general strike on 30 October to protest against the election delay.

On 30 October early in the morning, unrest broke out between police and protesters, who barricaded roads and burned tires, local residents and the police said. At least four civilians and a police officer were killed in clashes between security forces and protesters demanding the departure of President Kabila this year.

In reaction to the CENI's announcement, Nikki Haley the U.S. ambassador to the United Nations said that the DRC must hold a long-delayed election to replace President Kabila by the end of next year or the vote will lose international support.

#### **Bodies of ambushed travellers found in eastern Congo**

After an ambush on travellers that took place at the beginning of October in eastern DRC, bodies of 26 people have been discovered. The victims disappeared after they were ambushed by militants on a main road in North Kivu's restive Beni territory, where more than 800 people were killed in dozens of massacres between 2014 and 2016. Independent and separate U.N. experts say several armed groups as well as national army commanders have been involved in the killings.

#### Aid can reach the Kasai

President Joseph Kabila has agreed to help aid reach the Kasai, a region of the Democratic Republic of Congo where ethnic conflict has spawned a humanitarian emergency.

The conflict in Kasai region turned Congo into the world's biggest displacement crisis this year. Although many people have started going home, Beasley said Congo still had about 600,000 children on the brink of starvation and 7.7 million severely malnourished people.

# From Amnesty International's website DRC: Block on social media images an appalling attack on freedom of expression

In response to a Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC) government order to block the sharing of images on social media websites, Amnesty International's DRC researcher Jean-Mobert Senga said: "The order for internet companies to take 'technical measures' to limit social media use is an appalling attack on everyone's right to share and receive information.

"Most worryingly, it comes amid a worsening political crisis where the risk of human rights violations and abuses - and therefore the importance of social media as a documentation tool - is high.

"This move is the latest in a series of attacks on freedom of expression in the DRC, including the closure of several media outlets and the harassment of Congolese and international journalists.

"This unacceptable measure must be repealed immediately and people must be allowed full access to the internet and social media sites such as Facebook, Twitter, Instagram and Whatsapp."

#### **Background**

On 7 August, the president of the DRC telecommunications authority sent a letter to telecoms companies that provide internet services in the country.

It read: "To prevent abusive sharing of images through social media between clients of your network, I ask you to take the necessary technical measures to restrict the capacity to transfer images to the bare minimum."

The order came ahead of a two-day nationwide general strike called by the main opposition party, which is demanding the publication of the electoral calendar.

The government order followed a day of violence in several neighbourhoods in the capital Kinshasa, as well as in the central cities of Matadi and Boma, images of which were shared widely on social media.
