MYANMAR: FORMER CHILD SOLDIER JAILED AFTER GIVING INTERVIEW

In August 2017 a Radio Free Asia interview with Aung Ko Htwe was broadcast. In the interview he described how he was abducted from a railway station in Yangon, Myanmar's main city, in October 2005 and forcibly conscripted into the Myanmar military. He was just 13 years old at the time.

Following the broadcast of his interview, on 18 August 2017, Aung Ko Htwe was arrested. He was charged under section 505(b) of Myanmar's Penal Code, which criminalises any person who publishes or circulates information which may cause 'fear or alarm to the public or to any section of the public, whereby any person may be induced to commit an offence against the State or against the public tranquillity.' This vaguely worded provision has often been used to restrict the right to freedom of expression in Myanmar.

On 28 March he was convicted and sentenced to the maximum for the offence – two years imprisonment.

During his trial he criticised the presiding judge, announced that he did not have faith in the judicial system and refused to participate further in court proceedings. For this he was charged with 'intentional insult of a public servant sitting at any stage of a judicial proceeding' and sentenced to six months imprisonment.

In protest against his sentence, Ko Aung Htwe reportedly stepped on a printed copy of Myanmar's 2008 Constitution. He was charged with 'causing destruction of the whole of any part of the Union Seal' and faces up to 3 years in prison if found guilty.
