Scripted and Staged: Forced Confessions in China

**Peter Dahlin**, from Sweden, is a long-time human rights activist and co-founder of the NGO, China Action, which worked to strengthen the capacity of lawyers and human rights defenders, and undertook public interest litigation in China. He was detained by Chinese State Security agents on 3 January 2016. and pressured into making a televised confession.

Peter Humphrey was a British corporate investigator based in Shanghai when he was detained in July 2013. Mr Humphrey's first televised confession came shortly after he was charged in August 2013. He was sentenced to 2.5 years in jail in August 2014, considered an unusually harsh penalty for this charge. He was released six months early in 2015 on medical grounds. Wang Yu is one of China's most respected human rights lawyers. Originally a commercial lawyer, she dedicated herself to rights defence work in 2011 after her own experiences with police abuse and wrongful imprisonment. She and her husband were kept in Residential Surveillance at a Designated Location (RSDL) and detention for more than a year.

Li, a human rights defender, was detained and released around a year later, without charge. He was pressured repeatedly to confess on camera but resisted. His name and other identifying details have been concealed for his safety. Li still lives in China.
