# Actions you can take this month:

- ✓ Email Bangladesh's Minister of Home Affairs and ask him to stop his government's crackdown on free speech. Shahidul Alam faces 14 years behind bars in Bangladesh just for a media interview with Al Jazeera. In the interview he criticised the Bangladesh government and condemned the treatment of student protesters at recent rallies for safer roads. Go to the AIUK website <a href="www.amnesty.org.uk">www.amnesty.org.uk</a> and find the action on the home page.
- ✓ Call on the UK Home Office to stop blocking children's rights. Children in the UK can only apply for citizenship if they pay the Home Office £1,012. If they can't, they may not be able to study, work or even get hospital treatment. There are thousands of eligible children in the UK being priced out of their rights. Go to the AIUK website home page <a href="www.amnesty.org.uk">www.amnesty.org.uk</a> and follow the links to sign the petition.
- ✓ Sign the petition on the AIUK website to free Nazanin Zaghari-Ratcliffe, the British Iranian who has recently been returned to prison in Iran after being released for three days' leave to visit family.
- ✓ Make a date to join us for our next letter writing session on Thursday 8 November 1400-1530 at the Quaker Meeting House in Minehead.

#### Campaigns news

**BRAVE**: This campaign is about us speaking up for brave human rights defenders. And this month there is some GOOD NEWS! On 20 August Cambodian land rights activist, **Tep Vanny**, received a royal pardon and was freed from prison. She has been peacefully protesting for over 10 years against the destruction of her community to make way for a luxury development. In response she has been viciously targeted by the authorities, harassed, beaten, arrested and imprisoned three times. She was one of the key cases featured in the Brave campaign and we sent lots of action cards on her behalf.



I Welcome Refugees [Jill Walmsley]: The clamp down on rescue ships in the Mediterranean is likely to put the lives of thousands of migrants from North Africa at risk. Our petition to the Home Secretary urging action on re-uniting refugee families was taken to Roadwater fete and sent off with 64 signatures. There is another petition for us to collect signatures bringing attention to the prohibitive cost for children to register as UK citizens [see actions overleaf]. The Minehead Refugee Support Group has continued to host day visits for Syrian families living in Taunton. Amnesty members have supported these days out and also the fund-raising events. Two new families with four very young children between them have arrived recently in Taunton and are keen to come to Minehead on a visit. It is hoped this can be arranged soon. Women's Action Network [Cherry Bird] While it is great news that women in Saudi are now legally allowed to drive, there is still work to do as some women remain in prison as a result of their earlier protests. Take action online to demand their release <a href="https://www.amnesty.org.uk/actions/free-saudi-">https://www.amnesty.org.uk/actions/free-saudi-</a> women-who-fought-right-drive This encouraging move towards greater emancipation for Saudi women is only the beginning - there is a need for much wider reforms and changes in attitudes.

#### South Asia [Cherry Bird]

India: Did you know that India's top 10% of earners take 55% of all national income - the highest rate for any large country? Amnesty has identified two women as Individuals at Risk that we can campaign for. Our group has agreed to adopt **Salima Memcha** (Manipur) as a casefile and we will also be writing about Pavitri Manjhi (Chhattisgarh) as part of the Write for Rights 2018 campaign.

Nepal: lack of transitional justice for victims of the Maoist insurgency continues to be a major issue for Amnesty Nepal and they are working to create a system to effectively address this. The lack of rights for the Tharu people (the original indigenous people from the plains area) are also being researched as they are seriously marginalised and affected by the conflict.
