



#### **BACKGROUND**

The Cholistan Desert in eastern Pakistan is close to the border with India. The people in the desert live a seminomadic life, settling for periods of time and then having to move on in search of water and food for their animals. Because of the harsh conditions, camels are highly prized for transporting goods and also for trade. The isolation of the desert means local landowners can have a big influence on the people there.





#### **QUESTIONS FOR DISCUSSION**

- 1. What hints are there that Shabanu won't accept an arranged marriage as easily as her sister? Possible answers: She does 'male' jobs eg working with camels, she initially resists the chador, questions her father's authority eg protesting when Guluband is sold, envies Fatima who won't be forced to marry
- 2. What do you learn of women's position in this society at this time? **Possible answers:** Domestic duties eg cooking and serving tea, dressmaking etc. Sons preferred to daughters and prayed for. Sharma beaten by her husband for having a daughter. Bugti girl who is going to be killed by her relatives for eloping. Kulsum can't remarry after her husband's death although she is young
- 3. How did you feel about the ending?

In pairs take on the roles of Shabanu and Phulan and discuss your hopes for the future.
