Yiliyasijiang Reheman, China

We have written to the three MPs, Victoria Prentis, Jeremy Wright and Chris Heaton-Harris, that represent members of Banbury Area Amnesty. They passed on our enquiry and concern regarding the whereabouts of Yiliyasijiang Reheman to the Minister of Asia, Nigel Adams MP. We have entered into correspondence with him to see if he can bring this matter up with the Chinese Ambassador.

Group members have been involved with a campaign development session on the issue of China's treatment of the Uighurs. The multi group session was led by Amnesty's new Country Coordinator, Nabila Khan, with the aim of generating a number of campaigning strategies which are now being assessed by head office.

Nabila has also given two very well attended online talks about the current situation of the Uighurs in the Xinjiang and China's Belt and Road Initiative which is a driving force behind much of the appalling treatment of the Uighurs, among others. She also gave some very interesting and useful historical context of the region and its inhabitants.

GIVE URGENT PROTECTION TO FRONT-LINE HUMAN RIGHTS DEFENDERS

In communities around the world, people defending human rights are being threatened, attacked, imprisoned or killed. Banbury Area Group members have been campaigning to persuade the UK Government to help protect frontline defenders.

In 2019, it was reported that over 300 Human Rights Defenders were killed.

Without these courageous people risking their lives to defend human rights, too many violations would go unrecorded and unchallenged, potentially leaving whole communities defenceless. After contacting the Banbury MP, Victoria Pren-

tis, we had a swift reply assuring us that the Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office puts human rights and their defenders at the heart of its work. Amnesty, along with other partners, have published a suggested strategy that the UK could adapt and adopt. Those interviewed by Amnesty to inform the strategy, described how more outspoken and strategic interventions from the UK would make a positive impact to their lives:

"If the UK [prioritises HRDs]...they will help us to survive, because I'm sure the world needs us to stay here to make change."
