FOOTBALL WELCOMES!


In March, at a week's notice, we managed to pull together a Football Welcomes Refugees event with Stockport County Football Club.

CRISIS IN UKRAINE

The Russian invasion of Ukraine is a human rights catastrophe and Amnesty is calling on the UK government to urgently:

- Strengthen international efforts to protect civilians, provide humanitarian relief and help bring suspected perpetrators of crimes under international law to justice.
- Press for parties to the conflict to create & respect humanitarian corridors to safe havens, for all civilians to have access to transportation and time to leave, and for international observers to be granted access to monitor their safe passage.
- Fulfil the commitment to provide sanctuary to 200,000 Ukrainian refugees in the UK by providing safe routes to travel here, such as by a temporary visa waiver.
- Abandon measures which will do serious damage to the UK's asylum system.

END ISRAELI APARTHEID



Across Israel and the Occupied Palestinian Territories, Palestinians are treated as an inferior racial group and systematically deprived of their rights. **This is apartheid.** This new campaign aims to raise international awareness about the situation in Israel and the Occupied Territories. IDRIS KHATTAK Our Individual at Risk

Idris is a human rights worker who has been held at an unknown location by the military in Pakistan since he was forcibly abducted in November 2019. We believe he has now been tried by a military court on charges of treason and sentenced to 14 years in prison. We are one of a number of groups who write regularly to the government in Pakistan on behalf of Idris and his family.

Your Excellency Prime Minister,

I am writing to express my deep concern about Muhammad Idris Khattak who forcibly disappeared on 13 November 2019. I understand Idris Khattak has been sentenced by a military court to 14 years imprisonment for allegedly passing on official secrets to foreign agents.

The UN Human Rights Office of the High Commissioner has described Mr. Khattak's reported sentencing as "an attack against the human rights community in Pakistan". As a civilian, he should be tried by a civilian court.

I call on you to ensure the full restoration of Mr. Khattak's human rights, including unrestricted access to lawyers, a full medical assessment, his right to a civilian trial in full compliance with due process and his right not to be detained arbitrarily.

PANUSAYA SITHIJTRAWATTANAKUL (RUNG)



Rung – which means "rainbow" in Thai – became politically active while studying sociology and anthropology at university in the capital, Bangkok. She bravely took part in protests for social and political change throughout 2020. By August, she had become a protest leader. Watched by thousands, Rung called for equality, freedom of expression and – what is a highly sensitive topic in Thailand – the reform of the monarchy. Accused of provoking unrest, she was arrested in March 2020 under a lèse-majesté law that outlaws criticism of the monarchy. She was imprisoned for 60 days

during which she was diagnosed with Covid-19. The authorities denied her bail six times. In defiance, she went on a 38-day hunger strike and was released on 30 April 2021. Rung faces dozens of charges against her and, if found guilty, life imprisonment. "Once you step into the prison; you will no longer feel that your humanity is still intact," she says.
