

# Minutes of Amnesty International Reading Group Meeting, 13th July 2023

**Chair: Anne McFarlane** 

This meeting was held via Zoom.

#### 1. Welcome and introductions

Six people joined the meeting for some or all of it: Anne, Helen, Ruth, Vicky, Liz and our speaker, Sam Jonkers.

- **2. Sam Jonkers, from Care4Calais was our speaker today.** Sam is a volunteer for the local Thames Valley Group.

Sam told us that Care4Calais

- provides direct and essential aid for asylum seekers
- advocates for asylum seekers and refugees
- is staffed almost entirely by volunteers
- supports asylum seekers in Northern France, Belgium, but also significant work going on in the UK

Sam described how & why the charity's work has evolved and is so important.

- recent conflicts that have seen a surge and waves of people arriving
- withdrawal of so many services during COVID
- hostile atmosphere created by current government, including
  - o Rwanda scheme
  - o illegal immigration bill
  - o military bases being used to house people
  - Bibby Stockholm, the barge that will house 506 asylum seekers, soon to be in place this summer
  - possible re-opening of Campsfield
    - if people are in a detention centre, it's even harder to access information
    - another traumatising environment
  - children going missing
  - o people can be moved at any time
  - o food and board paid for, but then only £9.10 for all other expenses

Sam shared with us some of the FAQs people have about asylum seekers

- asylum can only be claimed once you are in the UK
- international law says it is not illegal to enter a country 'irregularly" to claim asylum
- in 2022, over 80% of claims were found to be genuine at the first hearing a further 50% found to be genuine on appeal
- Care4Calais campaign for safe passage for more countries currently schemes are available for Hong Kong and Ukraine.
- huge backlog of cases, made worse by the pandemic and recent international events such as Ukraine and Afghanistan
- some people have been in hotels for over 2 years and rising
- asylum seekers are not allowed to work

- lack of services to support them
- issues for people also include digital exclusion so much is now done online, forms, etc... but they have to find that access in their £9.10 per week.

#### Sam told us who they support in this area

- Asylum seekers in Home Office accommodation
- currently from 56 countries
- in Reading, 3 hotels are also being used this is new since COVID.
  - just a bedroom, families of 3 or 4 different ages, or could be sharing a twin room with a stranger
- here due to a variety of reasons genocide, religious persecution, persecution due to sexuality or gender, modern slavery for example
- a wide range of professions farmers, scientists, journalists, nurses, engineers

# When they are granted asylum, there are further challenges

- they have 28 days to find their own accommodation, access benefits, open a bank account, get a national insurance number, find a job
- this leads to many people becoming homeless (families with children cannot be made homeless)
- it is then the local council's responsibility to support them

#### What Care4Calais does - and can you help?

- volunteers support
  - provide food and clothing
  - o a friendly face
  - explain the asylum process and support with completing paperwork
  - teach English
  - support with finding voluntary roles (as they aren't allowed to work)
  - o support with sourcing mobile phones, bikes, laptops
  - create social events
  - o fundraise
  - collect donations
  - host a refugee
  - volunteer!!
