Group Updates – review of recent events:

Basingstoke Pride: Feedback

Basingstoke Pride struggled financing the day which resulted in the venue changing to a smaller site – we therefore lost out on having a stall. However, good weather added to a good enjoyable day. Although we didn't have a stall our presence was felt by handing out leaflets, stickers and 100 postcards. The event was also local for some members. It was decided to see what they come up with for next year.

Reading Pride: Feedback

This event has been going for 20 years, starting small but has flourished. The layout had changed this year and the weather was not on our side, so people didn't stay one as the weather deteriorated. However, it was friendly, energised and 300 people signed petitions. 10 people also signed up and money donated almost covered the cost of the pitch.

NB: lost gazebo due to windy weather and the framework losing nuts and bolts - canopy torn. Reading library of free things sometimes lists free gazebos so we could explore that in the future.

- Reading Amnesty Group Meal Out: well attended and went really well
- Chance2Dance4Charity a great night out very well attended 51 people, nearly £300 for Amnesty. Thanks to Sue for organising as always.

Two tickets to the Rugby final in Twickenham next year had been donated to the Chance to Dance raffle. It was decided to have a silent auction to raise the maximum amount of money - details of this auction to follow.

Group business

Afghan Women Campaign

As part of our work to raise awareness about, and our own understanding of, the situation for women in Afghanistan, 3 group members attended an event to mark the 4th year since the Taliban regained power. Hosted by Amnesty Feminists, we watched an excellent, BAFTA nominated short film "Yellow" and heard from its filmmaker, Elham Ehsas. Entrepreneur and poet, Meral Alizadaand spoke about how voices need to be given directly to Afghan women and poet Hadisa Hussain Afzalay read some of her very moving pieces. Whilst mostly a tough listen, all three were able to speak of joy and hope, able to bring humour and smiles as well as a passionate determination to do what they can to draw attention to the situation. Members feedback: a fantastic powerful event, left with a different connection to the country and what Afghan women are going through.

 - **3.** How will the UK Government formally support the <u>campaign</u> to codify Gender Apartheid under international law?
 - Helen and Ilaria will discuss when to present the main petition to 10 Downing Street. The other petition will be handed to local MP Olivia Bailey (Reading West & Mid-Berkshire) who will present it to parliament.
 - The webinar is still not finalised. We have speakers and organisers lined up. However, one of our speakers is very involved in the aftermath of the earthquake in Afghanistan, so we haven't heard back from her recently



A powerful new pop-up exhibition will lay bare the experience of UK national Anoosheh Ashoori who was arbitrarily jailed for 4½ years in Iran until his release - alongside Nazanin Zaghari-Ratcliffe - in March 2022

1st-30th November – Reading Biscuit Factory upstairs workroom space

"Surviving Evin" recreates the emotional and physical reality of his detention and will feature personal items Ashoori was able to smuggle out of Tehran's notorious Evin prison after his release.

This powerful exhibition is designed to take visitors through the years Ashoori spent in detention, from his arrest by Iranian intelligence officers and his first interrogations, time spent in solitary confinement, daily life with other inmates, the impact of his family's campaigning back home, and life after release.

Anoosheh Ashoori said:

"This exhibition aims to provide a deep insight into the challenges and triumphs I encountered during the 1,677 days of captivity, as well as life after my release.

I think the exhibition is a testament to the ability of the human spirit to endure, to find hope amid despair, to face adversity and to emerge stronger. I hope it reminds everyone who visits of the importance of empathy, understanding and solidarity in our shared humanity."

This exhibition is part of the Reading International Festival and presented by the Reading Amnesty International Group.

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
