Stop the Traffik: Modern Slavery



We were delighted to welcome **Anne-Marie Barry** of Stop the Traffik. Anne-Mare noted that the UK Modern Slavery Act had brought all legislation on trafficking and slavery together in one place, but data remained problematic. The UK Government official estimate is of 13,000 victims per year, but UK Border Force has put it at nearer 20,000. She said that responses to trafficking varied greatly across the UK depending on the resources

committed. For instance, Greater Manchester had a very effective and co-ordinated response, whilst Merseyside did not. For the first time statistics suggest that trafficking for labour exploitation was exceeding sexual exploitation; there has been an exponential increase in boys and young men trafficked into cannabis farms for instance. The Gangmaster Licensing Authority was making good progress but did not have authority over all industries so that weaknesses persist. Stop the Traffik had been set up in 2006 as a short-term campaign group to raise awareness but had evolved into the UK's largest and best known trafficking NGO. STT was co-ordinating data from all sources to present a comprehensive picture of the state of Modern Slavery in the UK today. The organisation was now part of an international alliance of NGOs working together on trafficking and slavery. Anne-Marie pointed out that whilst Eastern Europe, Asia and Africa were the origins of much trafficking, case studies attest to people from Italy and Sweden falling victim to traffickers. 
Monthly Letter: Cameroon

apace. Amnesty is calling on the UK to use more rigorous efforts to bring all parties to the negotiating table, to end the bombing campaign and to push for strengthened sanctions on those who are perpetuating the slaughter.

Westminster Corner



We received a reply from Jo Johnson MP in respect of our letter regarding the reuniting of refugee families. Mr Johnson states that the UK has been at the forefront of the response to the humanitarian crisis in Syria, and that he understands our concern to do more. There 'are no current plans to widen the criteria' for inclusion, which 'Ministers believe are fully compliant with the UK's international obligations'. He notes that 'three discretionary resettle-

ment schemes are also in place for recognised refugees for whom resettlement is the most appropriate answer.
