Journalists At Risk

Neville gave a presentation on the risk journalists face in pursuit of their profession. In 2015 71 journalists had been killed, 10 more than in 2014. Overall in the decade 2005-2015, there had been 596 journalists killed with an average of 54 per year – 2012 had been the worst single year in the past decade with 74 killings. 49 were murdered in 2015 and a further 17 were killed in combat – notably in Syria, which



was the most dangerous country in which to be a journalist with 14 deaths. Although the Charlie Hebdo atrocity was the worst single incident in 2015 (putting France in second place for the most deadliest place in 2015), there were 19 journalists killed in four countries (Brazil, South Sudan, Bangladesh and Mexico) that did not attract headlines. Since 1992, the New York based Committee to Protect Journalists has recorded 1,177 journalists killed in pursuit of their profession.

Burundi in Crisis

We took part in a West and Central Africa Regional Action focused on the disintegrating human rights situation in Burundi. According to the UN High Commissioner for Human Rights, at least 240 people have been killed in violent clashes between protestors and police in response to President Nkurunziza unilaterally changing the constitution to allow him to run for a



third presidential term. Peaceful protests have been violently suppressed and civilians killed. Since April 2015, a state of fear has existed in which journalists, opposition figures and human rights defenders have been murdered. We wrote as part of international efforts to draw attention to the spiral of violence, calling on the President and Minster for Public Security to end the attacks and bring perpetrators to justice. It was noted that a similar situation is developing in neighbouring Rwanda as the President extends his term, and Amnesty fears that at some point a repeat of the 1994 genocide could be ignited.

Monthly Letter: Iran

This month's letter draws attention to the case of **Omid Kokabee** a member of Iran's Turkmen minority who has served nearly half of a ten year jail term for 'having connections to a hostile government'. Omid is held to be a prisoner of conscience who has done nothing to merit imprisonment. It is thought the charges relate predominantly to his valid ties with academic institutions abroad. Held at Evin Prison in Tehran, he has been denied satisfactory medical care for health issues developed since his imprisonment, which include kidney stones.
