No Sweat: Exploited Labour, the Global Reality

Globalisation and the appearance of 'fast fashion' has increased

awareness of the true cost of supplying western consumers in terms of labour exploitation and worker conditions; for instance The Times reported Mauritian garment workers receive 12p an hour producing for Top Shop. We were therefore pleased to welcome **Vicki Morris** to the meeting to talk about '**No Sweat'** a grass roots campaigning organisation focused on empowering workers to organise for better conditions. Campaigns have focused on clothing, accessories, foot-ware and toys, where poor labour conditions, including long hours, sweatshop conditions, inadequate health and safety and child labour have caused concern. 'No Sweat' works with UK Trades Unions to help workers organise for themselves to force better conditions. We had a lively debate on the power of consumers to effect change rather than union power alone, and whether consumers can be encouraged to think more about where and how their throwaway fashion is made.

Campaign Action; Students at Risk

We signed letters to the Laos authorities regarding a group of student activists imprisoned for peacefully calling for political, social and economic change. Public demon-strations have not been permitted in Laos since 1975 and the government claims those arrested were



guilty of collusion with foreign nationals and spying. In fact the 30 young people were arrested for unfurling banners outside the National Assembly and were sentenced to lengthy terms of imprisonment. One, Khamphouvieng Sisaath later died following torture. Conditions of detention are poor and those found guilty are routinely held beyond their sentence terms. We called for their immediate and unconditional release.

Monthly Letter: India

Indigenous activist and Prisoner of Conscience, Kartam Joga has now served almost two years in Jagdalpur prison. Amnesty International believes he is being targeted for his human rights work in Chhattisgarh state, central India. Kartam Joga is an activist with the Communist Party of India, and an elected member of a local self-government body. He has documented human rights violations against the Adivasi Indigenous Peoples since 2005, when their hamlets were attacked by a private militia. He petitioned India's Supreme Court in 2007, demanding accountability for human rights violations committed by security forces and the Salwa Judum. No evidence has been found against Kartam Joga in three of the four cases against him, but he continues to be detained.
