Burma: too soon to stop campaigning!

We were delighted to welcome **Mary Hla** from **Burma Campaign UK**. She presented a chilling account of continuing ethnic genocide against tribal peoples and the Muslim community in Burma. In spite of the outward veneer of reform and the lifting of sanctions, human rights abuses remain widespread and acute.



The EU lifted all remaining sanctions (other than arms exports) in April, thereby giving international approval to the regime which is responsible for torture, forced evictions and killings. We will be showing **Burma VJ** on 22nd November at 7.30pm (usual venue) as part of our support Burma campaign work.

Monthly Letter: Laos

Two former student activists are serving 20-year prison sentences in Laos for attempting to display posters they had made which called for political, social and economic change in the country. **Thongpaseuth Keuakoun** and **Seng-Aloun Phengphanh** were among 30 young people belonging to the Lao Students Movement for Democracy who were prevented from

displaying the posters and then arrested in October 1999. They are being detained in conditions which are harsh, with poor medical care. Torture and other ill-treatment are common; prisoners are reportedly given tasks that are almost impossible to complete and severely punished when unable to do so. <u>Please address, sign and post the attached letter</u> calling for their release. This will cost 88p to post.

Mexico: Day of the Disappeared



30th August was **International Day of Enforced Disappearances**. It was in Latin America that this word first took on a new and cruel meaning. The "disappeared" have not vanished into thin air: many have been killed. Others will almost certainly never see their family again, held by criminal gangs or the authorities. In Mexico's dirty war of the late 1960s and the 70s, the government carried out a systematic persecution against society. Sadly, even now disappearances are still a terrible fact of life in Mexico.

On 29 July, Jose de Jesus Martinez Chigo and 17-year-old Diana Laura Hernandez Acosta were stopped at a checkpoint. A witness saw them being driven to a military compound. When the families of both victims went to the compound, they were told that no civilians were detained there. The next day marines took 17-year-old Raul David Alvarez Gutierrez away in a lorry. No one knows where he is. The number of people who have disappeared, whether abducted by criminal gangs or by public officials, has grown substantially since December 2006 when the federal authorities launched a large-scale policing operation to combat organised crime. In February 2013, the new President, Enrique Pena Nieto, published a list of more than 26,000 people who had been reported missing since 2006. The government has failed to provide any further information on the whereabouts of these people. We took part in an e-mail petition calling on the Mexican authorities to look into the cases of all those who have disappeared, bringing the perpetrators to justice and protect against any further abductions. New Amnesty Prisoner Case File: China

We signed our first letter to the Chinese authorities on behalf of **Dr Liu Xiaobo** and his wife **Liu Xia**, who we are campaigning for as part of our new prisoner case file. We will aim to complete at least one action each month.

Azerbaijan: Human Rights Violations Escalate

Azerbaijan holds an election on 9th October, and Amnesty is using the occasion to focus on the escalating human rights crisis under President Aliyev's autocratic rule. Amnesty has recorded 14 new Prisoners of Conscience detained in recent weeks; these include opposition candidates, journalists, pro-democracy activists and human rights defenders. A catalogue of other human rights abuses carried out include criminalising peaceful anti-government protest, police using excessive force to break up peaceful



demonstrations, threats and intimidation against human rights defenders, and the targeting of journalists who have been beaten, ill-treated, abducted, and imprisoned. We signed a Group letter calling for the release of all POCs and an end to intimidation and torture.
