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## Campaigning

### Planning pack 2014

We have just received this year's planning pack from AIUK with details of all the campaigns, country and Individuals at Risk work that we can take part in. We are currently opted in to most of the campaigns and our coordinators will be meeting in April to plan action. We will dedicate the June group meeting to an explanation and discussion of our plans. Make sure that you come along to find out what all the campaigns are about and decide what you want to be involved in.

### Women's rights

The Group marked International Women's Day with a Twitter marathon. Marie-Louise posted 19 tweets to remind all of our followers of the women's human rights issues in Afghanistan. Well done Marie-Louise!

### Syria

At our March group meeting we marked the 3rd anniversary of the Syrian Uprising by sending letters to both the Syrian government and the opposition forces calling on them to take action to stop the suffering of Syrian civilians. At the end of the meeting we held a mini photo shoot in St Ann's Square. This is one of many being held by a global coalition of NGOs and civil society (including Amnesty) who have created a joint campaign to mark the anniversary with a demonstration of solidarity with ordinary Syrian people.

### Stop Torture

This year marks the 30<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the UN Convention against Torture (CAT). Whilst this legal framework remains in place, the past decade has witnessed an alarming

rollback on the prohibition of torture. In 2012 AI reported the use of torture in 112 countries.

On 13th May Amnesty will launch a major international campaign against the use of torture. This will be a priority campaign for the whole of the international movement and will continue until December 2015. We expect the first campaign mailing shortly however, we have already made a start as we hope to feature this campaign at an event during the Manchester Literature Festival in October.

### Zimbabwe

Maggie Towse, AIUK Zimbabwe country coordinator, recently met Jestina Mukoko, the Director of the Zimbabwe Peace Project, an organisation that collects information on incidents and the effects of political and state-sponsored violence in Zimbabwe. The organisation and its staff have been targeted repeatedly over the years. The arrest of Jestina and other staff members in 2008 was the most serious in terms of overt violence to them, but raids on their offices and victimisation of staff has continued since then. Despite this they have continued to function, monitoring violence, compiling evidence to present to the authorities, and also identifying victims of violence and finding them the support and treatment that they need. They are

planning a new project to help children who have witnessed violence towards their parents and older siblings.

Jestina wishes to convey her thanks to all AIUK members who have worked for improved human rights in Zimbabwe and particularly those who sent her messages of solidarity during her period of detention and torture in 2008-09. She says that those messages came to her at a time when she felt 'down and out'. The cards and letters helped her to feel

that although she was 'down' she was most definitely not 'out!'

Zimbabwe gained Independence on 18 April 1980 and we will mark this date by signing a card at the April meeting to the Ambassador in London, to congratulate the country on its anniversary and also to remind the authorities of their obligations to uphold human rights for all its citizens.
