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Arms Trade Treaty

The world now has an international Arms Trade Treaty! The United Nations has adopted its first ever treaty aimed at controlling the trade in conventional weapons, voting it through by a large majority despite earlier being blocked by three countries. Member states represented in the UN general assembly voted by 154 to three, with 23 abstentions (including Russia and China), to control a trade worth an estimated £46bn a year.

The treaty is not ideal but prohibits states from exporting conventional weapons in violation of arms embargoes or weapons to be used for acts of genocide, crimes against humanity, war crimes or terrorism. It also requires states to prevent conventional weapons reaching the black market. At the moment, the treaty is adopted but "asleep" -- it needs to be ratified by 50 countries before it will enter into force. Campaigning organisations, like Amnesty will need to keep up the pressure to ensure that the treaty actually becomes a reality.

Campaign news

Burma – Dr Tun Aung

Ethnic and religious tensions remain high in Burma, with the trouble in Rakhine State (where our PoC was arrested and detained following his attempted peaceful intervention to calm civil unrest) spreading to other parts of the country, including



Rangoon and in particular in Meiktilar, central Burma.

Sadly, since our last meeting in March there has been no further news on the case of Dr Tun Aung, who has now been detained in Sittwe Prison, in Rakhine State, for nearly 10 months following his arrest in June 2012. We are asked to continue writing to Lt. Gen. Ko Ko, Ministry of Home Affairs and U Aung Min, Ministry of President Office with copies to the with copies to the Burma Human Rights Commission. The IS has stressed that it is of critical importance to avoid endangering Dr Tung Aung and his family that all correspondence in relation to his case is sent to the above named contacts only, and not to any other individuals/organisations.

Women in Afghanistan

In early March the Secretary of State for International Development, Justine Greening, spoke at the AIUK office to outline her department's approach to addressing, as she put it, 'the greatest unmet challenges of our time' – the inequality and discrimination faced in some form by women and girls in pretty much every society around the globe. There was much to applaud in Justine Greening's speech – not least her commitment to supporting the rights of women and girls in Afghanistan. But we need to see this commitment translated into a clear programme of work that includes funding for women's shelters and helping the Afghan police force support, not punish, the victims of abuse. It is also vital that the UK Foreign and Commonwealth Office similarly prioritises tackling violence against women and girls in Afghanistan. An important way to get this message through to Ministers is via our MPs, therefore we're looking for people to contact thier local MPs on this campaign to ask them to champion it within parliament.
