
Individuals at Risk

Asylum Justice Project

The subgroup now has four members. Actions undertaken so far include:

- Laura G is pursuing becoming involved as a visitor at the Pennine House IRC near Manchester Airport
- Heather has made contact with the Regional Asylum Activism group in the North West and will attend their August meeting on myth-busting and contacting MPs.
- Links with City of Sanctuary are being maintained and we are still pursuing the possibility of them coming to one of our meetings to speak about asylum issues in Manchester

Last week we sent round a plea for as many of us as possible write to our MPs asking them to sign the early day motion to condemn the 30% cut in asylum support for children from £7.50 to £5.20 per day, due to come into force on 10th August.
