Control Arms at the Foreign Office

To mark the adoption of the Arms Trade Treaty by the United Nations on 2nd April 2013, volunteers from Amnesty International and other organisations part of the Control Arms coalition were invited to a reception in Whitehall, at the Foreign and Commonwealth Office on 15th May. One of our group members, Sameena Matthiessen, managed to get a ticket to the reception and reports as follows:

"I have been involved with the control arms campaign since I joined the Manchester group in 2005 and like the rest of the group felt a great sense of achievement following the adoption in April. A lot of people, not only in Amnesty, but across the world and across the UK have worked hard for this and this was evident at the reception - there were representatives from other charities, schools, dignitaries from UK and other countries, MPs and general Whitehall workers, all having contributed over the last 20 years. The reception was presided by Alistair Burt (MP), Parliamentary Under-Secretary of State, Foreign and Commonwealth Office, who together with William Hague, our Foreign Secretary, Kate Allen, AIUK Director and Oxfam's Head of Arms Control Anna McDonald, all gave very moving (and funny at times) speeches.

William Hague acknowledged the work of the charities, including Amnesty, and promised an early ratification by the UK government. This was a reception to celebrate what had been achieved by charities and government together and to remind us that we still have work to do to ensure the countries ratify the treaty. I had a great time - spoke to several other Amnesty volunteers was again invigorated by the work of Amnesty International and the passion of its volunteers. I was also interviewed together with a few other volunteers about my involvement in the campaign and made sure I mentioned Manchester a few times!

If any of you happen to get invited to one of these things in the future, here are some tips: Dress code: lounge suit (wear what you would wear to interview - nice suit or dress), eat before you go (only nibbles served and I didn't seem to get to them early

enough), wear comfortable footwear (tube is 5min away and no chairs at reception)."
