'For a five-year-old she certainly can shift on her new bike. Her mum has to jog to keep up as Dyanna pelts down the pavement of their terraced street. "She's been pestering me for month's for a bike," says Ruth. "So when I got paid I just went to Argos and bought the cheapest." Not an unremarkable scenario except that, after she's paid all the outgoings from her illegal job, I know that Ruth has barely £25 a week to spend on food for herself and her energetic daughter. She doesn't budget, tries not to think too much about the impossibility of making ends meet. Instead her energies go into staying under the radar – an undocumented migrant in limbo, unable to go forward or back.' I've been telling Ruth and Dyanna's story for six months or so, hopeful that the reality of undocumented lives will educate and inform. The website on which their daily struggles feature – Life Without Papers – was shortlisted for the Amnesty International Media Awards this year. It didn't win but sharing a room with dozens of inspirational journalists, film-makers and editors was triumphant enough. I bought a new shirt for the occasion. The fact it cost the same as Ruth's weekly disposable income wasn't lost on me.

We are proud to present an afternoon with London-based writer, critic and broadcaster, Bidisha. Specialising in social justice and international affairs, Bidisha is a 2013 International Reporting Project Fellow working to raise awareness of global development issues.



Bidisha will be reading from her new book, Beyond the Wall: Writing a Path Through Palestine, described as 'an unflinching portrait of life in the West Bank'. The book draws on testimonies given by activists, ordinary citizens, international aid workers and foreign visitors. It also draws upon Bidisha's own personal experience of the West Bank's checkpoint culture.

The event brings to light the often hard-to-grasp reality of life in an occupied territory. It reveals the diversity of experience and different aspects of the occupation, focusing on a variety of locations. The talk will be followed by a short question and answer session and an opportunity to buy the book and have it signed.
