An Amnesty Supporter Abroad...



In September of last year, I moved away from the Brighton and Hove Amnesty group to take a job teaching English in Nancy. Nancy is a city in Eastern France, situated in the centre of Lorraine (a region famous for its quiches!). The region's proximity to the borders with German and Luxemburg makes it both historically and culturally interesting. The small mountain range, known as the Vosges, located in the south of Lorraine, also

attracts many tourists from both within and outside France. However, in recent years the region has suffered economic decline, mainly due to the collapse of its traditional industries, such as mining. Rising unemployment is a large concern, with 11.1% out of work at the end of 2013, slightly above the national average. Nancy itself, largely due to its huge student population (10% of residents during term time),



is a bustling city with a very attractive old town. The most famous area is the large 18th century square named Place Stanislas (after the former Polish King and Duke of Lorraine who played an important role in expanding the town). The square is now a UNESCO World Heritage Site. I always knew I wanted to continue supporting Amnesty during my stay in France, so, on arrival in Nancy, I quickly got in contact with the local student group and in October I went along to my first meeting. Everyone was welcoming, friendly and full of ideas. It all felt very familiar... Amnesty International France (AIF) was created in 1971. It currently has 400 local and student groups (known as 'antennes jeunes'). It's National Secretariat (which coordinates AIF's activities) has 69 paid staff and 350 volunteers and AIF has 2,250,000 supporters. The President of AIF (the equivalent to Kate Allen) is a lady called Geneviève Garrigos. AIF and AIUK share similar campaigning priorities, such as forced evictions, the death penalty, torture, individuals at risk, discrimination and the Middle East and North Africa. Also like Amnesty UK, Amnesty France is a very creative section. I'm sure you've all seen the moving animation

'Signatures' which is an AIF production.

Nancy boasts two Amnesty groups: one for students (AJ Nancy) and another, larger local group (Amnesty Nancy), which is the equivalent to the Brighton and Hove group. Throughout this year, I have taken part in activities organised by both organisations. For example, in the first

term, the antennes jeunes decided to focus on a campaign regarding discrimination against Roma, in particular forced expulsion. We organised a flash mob on Place Stanislas where we re-enacted the demolition of a Roma settlement by the police (making a lot of noise whilst doing so!). We took advantage of people's natural curiosity and whilst they crowded around us we requested signatures for our petition. We also attracted the curiosity of the real police, but after reassuring them that we were not setting up camp for good, they let us carry on!

The other Amnesty group is particularly good at fundraising. One annual fundraiser which

works incredibly well exploits the mad Christmas shopping rush. Amnesty Nancy has a relationship with a very large shop in the centre of the town. Each year, the shop gives

the organisation a free space at the entrance and piles of wrapping paper, tape and ribbon. Amnesty members take turns in wrapping the customers' new purchases in return for a donation. I helped out for a couple of hours and I have never wrapped so many presents over such a short time! It really helped me to get into the festive spirit.

Other activities throughout the year have included film screenings, panel discussions, book sales and stalls.

The strengths of Nancy antenne jeunes are the enthusiasm for carrying out creative, public actions and the ability to pull things together at the very last moment! However, with all student groups, the constant turnover of members is a concern and this makes it challenging to carry out sustained campaigns. The positives of Amnesty Nancy are its large network of supporters in the city and its propensity to carry out large annual events. The two groups complement each other well and together, definitely help to boost public awareness of Amnesty International in Nancy.

However, nothing quite compares to the dynamic and lovely Brighton and Hove group. I am looking forward to seeing you all again this summer!
