IMPROVE ACCESS TO MATERNAL HEALTH RIGHTS

In Mkhondo municipality in Mpumalanga Province, South Africa, an antenatal check-up can be a humiliating and even frightening experience.


Amsterdam, a typical town in the region, has only one antenatal clinic that everybody uses. Women and girls say that the nurses there shout at girls for getting pregnant too young or without being married, are physically rough with patients, and gossip about people in front of other patients.

Administrative procedures and the clinic's physical layout make it possible to identify patients attending for HIV treatment, so there is a real fear of HIV test results being disclosed to family and neighbours. For many women and girls, it's enough to put them off seeking antenatal care. And those most likely to be deterred are those whose health is at greatest risk during pregnancy: women with HIV and adolescents.

Not using the service – or leaving it too late – could lead to avoidable health risks, and even death.

In your letter:

- Call on the Minister to ensure that the Department of Health implements effective measures to improve 'Caring and Positive Attitudes' in health facilities in Mkhondo Municipality as recommended by the National Healthcare Facilities Baseline Audit 2012/13.
- Urge him to prioritise training for healthcare workers on patient rights and how to provide professional, nondiscriminatory services particularly to adolescents.
- Ask him to ensure barriers that prevent women and girls in Mkohondo accessing antenatal care and emergency health services are removed.
