Bidisha at Manchester Literature Festival

A packed house came to hear Bidisha introduce her book, *Beyond the Wall: Writing a Path through Palestine*.

She relayed her own experience of refugee camps that have existed for four decades, the wall, checkpoints and constant shouts of "Forbidden, forbidden" alongside the words of Palestinian adults and children for whom these are everyday experiences: "We are children. We deserve a childhood". "My hope is that children will not internalize the wall", says one academic. Who would like to live with watchtowers just outside the balcony?" The destructive impact of



the occupation on occupiers as well as occupied generated questions and comments on what seems an intractable situation.

While Bidisha signed copies of her book (above) we collected signatures on a letter to the Israeli authorities on behalf of Ahmad Qatamesh, an academic and writer who has previously criticized both the Israeli authorities and the Palestinian Authority. Ahmad is held under a six-month administrative detention order which has been repeatedly renewed since May 2011.

The event raised £235 for the Group. Thanks again to the Literature Festival and to all who came along and supported the event.

Women's Rights in Afghanistan

I had the privilege of attending an Amnesty reception for MPs at the Speakers' House. The objective was to raise their awareness and win their support for women's rights in Afghanistan. It was very well attended by at least 15 MPs with one MP taking the mic to encourage Amnesty members to keep pushing MPs for their support. Kate Allen spoke together with an Afghan human rights defender. What was wonderful about it was that different Amnesty members involved in the campaign, from youth members, student members, local group members, the Afghanistan country coordinator and International Secretariat researchers to
