The Help, by Kathryn Stockett - (Reader review adapted from www.amazon.co.uk)

Paperback: 464 pages Publisher: Fig Tree (23 July 2009)

Set in Jackson, Mississippi in 1962, the story is narrated by three women: black maids Aibileen and Minny, and Miss Skeeter, is a white college graduate who wants to make something of her life. We follow these women as they embark on a dangerous journey to try and change decades of prejudice and pave the way for a better life for future generations. Through the words of each of these women we learn how rife racism and intolerance were back in the Deep South in the1960's. There are tales of cruelty and humiliation but also times of tenderness and real love. The story is told in all its rawness, primarily from the point of view of the black maids; of the mistrust and even hatred on both sides of the colour divide. Despite the subject matter, the book never feels too heavy or preachy: it is as light as one of Minny' famous cakes and there are moments that are both riotously funny and tender.
